# Submission in response to the New Australian Government Data Sharing and Release Legislation issues paper

## 1. About us

## 2. Background

ALIA has been pleased to contribute to the Australian Government's thinking around data sharing and release. In 2016, we responded to the Productivity Commission's *Data Availability and Use* issues paper and participated in the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet's Research Roundtable on High-Value Data. We have also been part of related discussions about Australia's research infrastructure and open government. We welcome this latest opportunity to respond to the New Australian Government Data Sharing and Release Legislation issues paper on behalf of our Members.

## 3. National Data Commissioner

Our only comment in relation to the issues paper is that we are pleased to read of the Australian Government's plan to appoint a National Data Commissioner to oversee data sharing and release.
